

- 1. Read about the neuropsychology of criminal personality on page 15.
- 2. Use this information to label your diagram (add a diagram of the brain if needed) so that you have answered the following questions:
- a) How does the central nervous system relate to arousal levels and the criminal personality?
- b) How do synapses and dopaminergic neurons interact in an overactive dopamine system? How does this cause psychoticism?
- c) Outline the role of dopamine reward systems, the reticular activation system (RAS) and the cerebral cortex? How do they cause extroversion?
- d) Describe the role of the **autonomic nervous** and the **limbic system**. How do they explain the development of **neuroticism**?


